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COL. MITCHELL READY FOR TRIAL

Former Air Officer Completes Plans For Defense In Court Martial

Washington, Oct. 26.—(United Press)—Preparations of Colonel William Mitchell for his defense against charges of misconduct preferred by the war department were virtually completed today as a result of an extended conference over the week-end.

Mitchell and his two lawyers, Representative Frank R. Reid, Illinois, republican, and Colonel Herbert A. White, judge advocate for the eighth corps area, spent the entire Sabbath together going over various phases of the case.

Two air service officers who aided Mitchell in preparing his testimony for the president's air board, carried a batch of Mitchell's evidence and reports to Reid's office at the capitol for examination by the two lawyers.

While Reid announced Saturday that constitutional guarantee of free speech would form the foundation of Mitchell's defense, no statement on other points was forthcoming after the lengthy conference yesterday.

It is understood that Reid and White are now delving into the records of members of the court which will try Mitchell. Whether they will challenge any of them will not be known until the opening day of the trial.

Sentence was withheld pending decision of the defense as to whether an appeal will be taken.
