what aid they could to those who were most seriously hurt.

W. G. Davis, of Oxford, Miss., was one of the first injured brought to Memphis.

"We were traveling at 60 miles an hour when the train suddenly gave a lurch and car after car toppled down the embankment," he said.

"Cars were piled on top of one another. I saw several dead and a number of others who were badly mangled. Passing motorists and farmers living nearby came to the rescue with axes and shovels and extricated those who were trapped.

"I was only slightly hurt and aided in rescuing Miss Olive Webster, a nurse from Oxford, who suffered a broken hip. We were brought to Memphis in a car.


