THE DEATH OF

C. S. NIBLICK:—

There are times when words are idle and when anything that can be said fail to relieve and this is one of those times. We can and this community will pay sincerest respects to an honorable citizen who has done much for his community, who has lived a clean life, who has fought always for his friends—but we cannot restore to the family their beloved husband, father, brother, nor to the thousands who mourn today, their friend.

Charles S. Niblick, president of the Old Adams County Bank, a leader in many ways, a community worker, friend to rich and poor alike, died at the Mercy Hospital at Gary at 12:40 o'clock this morning. He had been taken there from Indiana Harbor a week ago and an emergency operation was performed in hopes of saving his life. Encouraging word came from time to time and only yesterday morning the attending physicians expressed hope for his ultimate recovery. During the afternoon however, he suffered a relapse and though every known stimulant was administered and everything possible done, he sank gradually into the sleep of Eternity. He became unconscious early in the evening and his death followed at midnight.

It is needless to say that this community feels the shock. No man here numbered so many warm and admiring friends, no man here had worked more faithfully for others, no man here had taken part in so many lines of public endeavor as did Charley Niblick. He not only carried his burden, but always a little more. He was a banker, a business man, a churchman, a lodgemem, a Rotarian, a booster for every thing that was clean and good and no one ever heard him decline to serve. He was treasurer of almost countless organizations and yet he always found time to encourage the other fellow. He was a friend to every one and every one knew him and knew that when he took his troubles to him he would not only find sympathy, but concrete help. He entered the Old Adams County bank when but fourteen years of age and had served that institution continuously forty-five years, filling every position from errand boy to president, excepting that of vice-president. His smile, his hand wave, his pleasant words were assets worth while. It was a pleasure to know him, to meet him, to advise with him and he will be sadly missed in almost every circle in this community. His place cannot be filled in home, church, lodge, business or the many other niches of Decatur and Adams county where he belonged and where he was looked to so often.

He was your friend and our friend. His keen mind contained no enmity toward any one, only a desire to make it easier for those about him, his frail body was constantly urged on that he might serve and his greatest happiness was to see others successful. It is therefore not to be wondered at that this community is stunned today


