### Heche Found Guilty In City Court At Bluffton

Bluffton, Oct. 28.—Laverne Heche of Vera Cruz, was found guilty again of liquor law violation Tuesday at a trial held before Special Judge John Edris in city court. The court found Heche guilty of three counts, namely, transporting, possessing and giving liquor to Sam Gehring on September 12, 1925, and assessed a fine of \$100 and sentenced the defendant to serve 60 days at the state farm. Heche was represented by Attorney D. E. Smith, of Fort Wayne, and furnished bond of \$500 to appeal his case following the decision of the court.

Heche is charged with liquor law violation in five cases, two filed in the city court and three in the circuit court. The case yesterday ends his trials in the city court. He was found guilty a few days ago in the first case, which was tried before a jury, and he has also appealed that case. His bond in all five cases is \$3,000, and for that reason, Special Judge John Edris made his bond in the case tried yesterday \$500. Heche has appealed both the cases tried in the city court.

## ONE OF CITY'S MOST PROMINENT CITIZENS PASSES

(Closs) Niblick. He was educated in the Decatur common and high schools. Mr. Niblick entered the service of the Old Adams County Bank at the age of fourteen and for forty-five years he has been connected with that institution, holding every position with the exception of vice-president.

Mr. Niblick has long been a figure in Indiana banking circles. His first position with the Old Adams County Bank was that of book-keeper, when that concern was still known as The Adams County Bank. He then served as clerk, assistant cashier and cashier before becoming president. He was elected president of the bank in 1906, which position he has held continuously until his death.

### Faithful Public Servant

Mr. Niblick has always been a faithful public servant. He was identified with the American Security Company as a director and Adams County Auto company as secretary. He was, at the time of his death, a director in the Provident Building and Loan association; the Washington township advisory board and the Decatur Community Chautauqua association. He has been active for more than forty years in all civic affairs of Decatur and Adams county. He has served as treasurer of more organizations than any other man in the county. He was a charter member of the local Knights of Columbus and later was honored by receiving the Fourth degree, and a charter member of the B. P. O. Elks. He served as Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus from 1909 to 1911 and during the remainder of the time since the organizing of that lodge he has been treasurer. He was also state treasurer of the Knights of Columbus for two years. He has been treasurer of the Elks since the organizing in this city.

Mr. Niblick was a faithful member of the Decatur Rotary club and his death is the first one in that organization since its founding in this city. Mr. Niblick acted as chairman of the finance committee of the new Catholic school and saw that project grow from a dream to an actuality. He was a faithful member of the St. Mary's Catholic church. He has been an advisor and friend of both young and old people of this community for more than a quarter of a century and was one of the best known and highly respected citizens of the community.

### Widow and Children Survive

All his life, Mr. Niblick has worked for a better Decatur and Adams county. In 1889, he was married to Miss Minnie Waldron, of Niagara Falls, New York. Mrs. Niblick and four children survive. The children are Dr. James Stewart Niblick, of Indiana Harbor; Mrs. Perry Gandy, of near Fort Wayne; Margaret and Charlotte, at home. Three grandchildren also survive. They are Naomi Gandy, a daughter of Mrs. Perry Gandy, and Charles and Anna Belle Niblick, children of Dr. Niblick.

Two brothers, Daniel M. and John, of this city, and two sisters, Miss Amelia and Miss Mary, of this city, also survive. Two brothers, William and James, preceded Mr. Niblick in death several years ago.

The funeral will be held at 9 o'clock Friday morning from the St. Mary's Catholic church with solemn requiem high mass conducted by the Rev. J. A. Seimetz. The remains may be viewed at the Niblick home on North Third street.

## Attempt Made To Bribe Burt Morgan To Step Out

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 28.—(United Press)—Representatives of an illegal booze ring, operating in Indianapolis and St. Louis attempted to bribe Burt C. Morgan, former federal prohibition director for Indiana, to quit his post. It was learned today as the federal grand jury continued its investigation of the ring.

Morgan, it was understood, was approached several times by men who said they were connected with George Remus, bootleg king of Cincinnati, with an offer of \$250,000 if he would step out.

Morgan refused all offers. He was later relieved from duty under the re-

organization of the dry forces. Remus, who has appeared before the grand jury here, said the men who approached Morgan were not authorized to do so by him.
