Review Story of Abduction

Cox reviewed the story of Miss Oberholtzer's alleged abduction as told in her deathbed statement and launched into an attack on the character of Stephenson.

"The evidence will show that Stephenson had a double personality," Cox said. "One side of him will show a magnetic, culture leader of men. The other side will show him a drunkard, and a persistent seducer and destroyer of woman's chastity."

Stephenson's palatial home in Irvington, a suburb of Indianapolis, was at times the scene of "lascivious drinking debauches," Cox said.

"To his house, upon occasion, virgin girls and good women were lured to be entrapped and debauched," Cox asserted.

At other times, Cox said, the Stephenson home was the scene of gatherings of people high in the affairs of the city and state.

Cox's scathing denunciation of the former Klan leader brought a storm of protest from Ira Holmes, one of the defense attorneys.

Judge Sparks ordered that reference to Stephenson being a drunkard and seducing women be kept out of his records.

Cox read the law fixing the penalty for first degree murder and stressed the word "death" in his reading. Stephenson busied himself with some notes.

As court opened the three defendants walked to their seats with an air of indifference. Klenck was laughing.

For the first time since the trial started, Sheriff Gooding stood guard behind the chairs of the defendants.
