Fremantle, Australia, Nov. 3.—(United Press)—Serious clashes between police and riotous seamen strikers occurred here when strikers stormed police guards protecting the British steamer Borda, as she was maneuvering into anchorage.

The police answered the strikers' volley of stones and coal by charging with drawn batons.

One constable was badly wounded and he was taken to a hospital while many strikers and police were less seriously injured. Sixty-five arrests were made.

The visible supply here is no larger than it was last May which means that the quantity in storage is far below requirements for the next six months.

Strength in wheat boosted corn. Lack of good support kept the advance within fractional limits.

## DRY OFFICER RESIGNS

Deputy Administrator For Eastern Michigan District Says Detroit Is Wettest City.

### Bulletin

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 3.—(United Press)—Asserting "there is something radically wrong with law enforcement in Detroit," A. B. Stroup, deputy federal prohibition administrator for the eastern Michigan district, tendered his resignation today.

In a sensational statement announcing his resignation, Stroup expressed his "amazement" at the "wide open" condition of the city and declared "I can say without reservation that Detroit is the wettest city I have ever been assigned to."

Stroup accompanied his statement with the announcement that his resignation had been accepted. He will leave the federal service with little reluctance, he declared.

### Early Passage Of New Tax Bill Is Predicted

Chicago, Nov. 3.—Congress probably will make the people a Christmas present of \$400,000,000 in income taxes, Congressman Nicholas Longworth, of Ohio, declared in a speech here last night.

Congress is anxious to enact the proposed new bill for reducing income taxes and Longworth predicted that this will be one of the first items of business when the legislators convene on Dec. 7. By Christmas the bill should be in the law form, he said.

The so-called radical congressman from Wisconsin and other northwestern states will get little of importance in the way of committee appointments, Longworth declared. Important key positions will be kept away from them, and they will not be placed in positions where they can exert too much influence, he held.

Longworth also said that congress was determined to brook no dictation from anyone.

But congress will be glad to co-operate with the president and the cabinet, he said. President Coolidge, he described as a square peg in a square hole.

### City Attorneys Will Discuss Bell Phone Rates

Indianapolis, Nov. 3.—(United Press)—A conference between attorneys representing twenty cities served by the Indiana Bell Telephone company and members of the public service commission will be held here Monday, it was announced today.

The conference will be preliminary to the hearing for a rate increase by the company which will be held Nov. 16.

Results of the investigation conducted by the commission to determine the condition of the telephone company, will be discussed.

The investigation followed an order from the federal court which would give the telephone company an increased income of \$600,000 in sixty-four cities.

This increase was granted after the commission had allowed the company an increase of \$1,000,000 in income.

A long series of hearings are in prospect over the rate fight, it was said.

### Cash Register Salesmen Face Contempt Charges

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 3.—(United Press)—Charged with a violation of a decree regulating competition, 92 salesmen of the National Cash Register company, Dayton, O., were under contempt of court order today and will appear in federal court here Dec. 15 for hearing.

The order was issued at the request of John L. Lott, special investigator of the department of justice, who has been investigating the sales policy of the cash register concern.

Lott charged specifically that the salesmen adopted unfair sales methods in competing with the Remington Cash Register company, Ilion, N. Y.; the American Cash Register company, Saginaw, Mich., and the St. Louis Cash Register company, St. Louis.

### Rural Teachers To Hold Conference At Muncie

Muncie, Ind., Nov. 3.—Rural school teachers and superintendents from all parts of the Eighth district will meet here November 11, for the rural school teachers' conference.

Dr. Henry N. Sherwood, state superintendent of public instruction will be the principal speaker.

Other speakers will be George Spencer, assistant state superintendent; Prof. O. F. Hall, Purdue University and L. A. Pittenger, of Ball Teachers' College, Muncie.

## PAINLEVE FACES MUCH OPPOSITION

### French Socialists Refuse To Vote Confidence In New Cabinet

Paris, Nov. 3.—(United Press)—Faced by the Socialists refusal to vote confidence in his regime, Premier Painleve went before the chamber of deputies and announced that the cabinet favors "bold measures" to meet France's financial dilemma.

Among the measures he revealed was the government's firm intent to continue debt funding negotiations with America and England in the hope of achieving "an equitable solution" such a solution he pictured as necessary that France and its traffic should be safely sheltered from financial risks which might arise out of uncertainty.

The Socialists early in the day had definitely declined to register their confidence in the new cabinet. Undaunted, Painleve faced the chamber while politicians predicted for his government at best only a short lease of life.

He told the deputies that his cabinet was convinced of the necessity for rapid action in restoring financial equilibrium in France. He counseled against exaggerating the seriousness of France's position, yet he added:

"We are reaching a decisive turn and cannot live indefinitely with economic instability."

The budget expenses, he said, must be met from taxation and there must be no inflation. The cry of inflation was one of the things that unseated Painleve's former finance minister, Caillaux, into the discard.

He proposed to meet the national demands through what he called a "national sacrifice" and announced that "all forms of wealth will participate in this sacrifice."
