TWO UNDEFEATED TEAMS TO MEET

Dartmouth And Cornell To Battle Saturday; Other Games Hold Interest

New York, Nov. 5.—(United Press)
One of the six major undefeated teams, striving for sectional and national honors, will be forced out of the select group Saturday when Dartmouth and Cornell meet up in the mountains at Hanover.

Dartmouth can put forward a strong claim for national recognition if the team passes undefeated through a schedule that contained games with Harvard, Brown, Cornell and Chicago. Syracuse, another of the eastern candidates, goes out of the family circle by an intersectional game against Ohio Wesleyan, one of the strong Ohio conference teams. Syracuse ought to win.

Michigan, regarded by all the critics who have seen the team in action as the strongest eleven on the field, plays Northwestern, one of the weaker teams of the Western conference. With Northwestern, Ohio State and Minnesota ahead, only a severe mental let-down can keep Benny Friedman and company from the conference title.

The complicated situation in the Pacific coast conference may be straightened out—partially when Washington meets Stanford and California meets Washington State.

Several other games, including Notre Dame against Penn State, Washington and Jefferson against Pittsburgh, and Princeton against Harvard will command interest.



Indiana's Gold Medal Herd



At the National Dairy Show, which has just closed at Indianapolis, much interest was displayed in the pure bred Jersey herd owned by R. W. Riggs of Inglesfield, Indiana. This herd is the first and only herd of any breed to secure a gold medal in cow testing association work. To win this highest award six cows in this herd produced over 500 pounds of butter-fat in one year, while four others produced over 300 pounds of fat in one year.

Mr. Riggs is a quiet, unassuming farmer who formerly kept only grade cattle. Some seven years ago he exhibited a few head at his local fair and won highest honors. The blue ribbon went to the cow carrying the purest blood. Mr. Riggs thought that this was particularly significant. He said, "If the highest grade is my best cow, sure breeds should be better. I will build up a herd of pure breeds." From that time on registered Jerseys gradually replaced the grades, and this year the Riggs herd proved itself to be a really outstanding dairy herd, the only one of its kind in the Hoosier State.
