ILLINOIS-CHICAGO GO IS HEADLINER

"Red" Grange's Fame Attracts Great Interest; Other Big Ten Games

Chicago, Nov. 6.—(United Press)—

Although it will have little if any bearing on the Big Ten championship, the Illinois-Chicago game at Urbana tomorrow will draw the biggest crowd and the most interest of any gridiron contest in the middlewest.

Red Grange, who hit his stride in the Penn game last week, is largely responsible for the widespread interest in the game at Urbana. Fans realize that this is Red's last year of collegiate competition and the season is rapidly drawing toward its close. As many as can get into the huge stadium will be there.

Extra bleachers seating 2,000 spectators have been erected bringing the total attendance tomorrow to 69,000. Nineteen special trains will be run from Chicago.

Illinois has been beaten by Iowa and Michigan and Chicago was tied by Ohio State which means that unless Michigan and Iowa are unexpectedly defeated before the end of the season, tomorrow's game at Urbana will not affect first place in the conference standing.

There are three other games tomorrow between Big Ten rivals, two of which will come close to the Illinois-Chicago game in general interest.

Coach Burt Ingwerson's Hawkeyes, with victories over Illinois and Ohio State to their credit, meet Wisconsin at Iowa City. The Badgers have been one of the outstanding disappointments of the season and unless they show great improvement tomorrow, Iowa's slate will remain clean.

Michigan's powerful team swings into action against Northwestern's Wildcats.

Ohio State and Indiana meet at Columbus. Both teams have been defeated but Ohio has a big chance on the Hoosiers.

The other Big Ten teams meet non-conference opponents, Minnesota taking on Butler at Minneapolis, and Purdue clashing with Franklin at Lafayette.

Yellow Jackets To Play At Van Wert Saturday

The Decatur high school football team will go to Van Wert, Ohio, Saturday to play the Scarlet and Gray team of Van Wert high school, old rivals of the Yellow Jackets. In the last game between the two teams, played at Van Wert two years ago, the score was 0-0. Both teams will enter the contest Saturday, fresh from victories on the preceding Saturday, the Yellow Jackets having defeated Garrett, 6-0, and Van Wert having downed St. Marys, Ohio, by the same score. Several fans will accompany the team to Van Wert.

Child, 5, Shot By Her Brother, 7, Is Likely To Die

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 6.—(United Press)—Slight hope was held by physicians today for recovery of five-year-old Mary Safoni, shot yesterday by her seven-year-old brother Peter "because she called me a monkey."

The child is in a hospital suffering from a severe bullet wound in the head, received, the brother told police, when he procured his father's revolver and shot her following a quarrel.

The quarrel resulted from efforts by the boy to take a doll away from his sister, he said. In retaliation the girl hit him with a stick and called him a "monkey," according to his story to police.

Physicians at Receiving hospital this noon reported the wounded child's condition was grave with slight hope for recovery.
