## May Increase Tax Cut To \$350,000,000

Washington, Nov. 9. — (United Press)—The house ways and means committee may slash \$160,000,000 from the nation's automobile and other excise taxes and run the total reduction of the new federal tax bill up to \$350,000,000, some \$50,000,000 more than Secretary of the Treasury Mellon considered safe.

This suggestion was advanced from both the republican and democratic sides of the committee today as sessions were resumed in executive session.

Only the excise taxes remained to be disposed of before the rate provisions of the bill are concluded except for some details of drafting.

The bill is expected to be concluded before the end of the week.
