Pennsy Railroad Places An Embargo On Potatoes

Altoona, Pa., Nov. 11. — (United Press)—Because of the extremely heavy freight movement on the Pennsylvania railroad, an embargo has been placed on the shipment of potatoes at certain points on its lines. Speculators have bought up all available potatoes in this section and in two weeks the price has been boosted 150 per cent and \$3.50 bushel retail, is predicted by jobbers here. Railroad officials report hundreds of carloads of potatoes held in the Pittsburgh yards as well as many carloads in the local yards.

Four deputy sheriffs of Marion county had testified for Klenck that he was busy taking prisoners to the penal farm at the time he was supposed to have carried Marge Oberholtzer home following an alleged attack by Stephenson.

Noblesville, Ind., Nov. 11.—(United Press)—The state today attacked the alibi of Earl Klenck, on trial here with D. C. Stephenson, former Klan dragon, and Earl Gentry, on charges of murdering Miss Marge Oberholtzer. Three prisoners who were taken from Indianapolis to the state penal farm at Putnamville on the morning of March 17, were called by the state on rebuttal to shatter the alibi. Klenck, a deputy sheriff of Marion county at that time, was not their

Man And Four Children Burn To Death In Home

East Orange, N. J., Nov. 11.—Trapped in their bedroom on the third floor of a six family dwelling, Joseph De Stefano and four of his children perished in flames early today. The mother, Mrs. Anna De Stefano, escaped by leaping from a window. She tossed her 14 months old daughter, Carmillo, to safety into the arms of a neighbor. Both Mrs. De Stefano and Carmillo were severely burned, however.

The dying statement of Miss Oberholtzer said Klenck was the man who carried her home from Stephenson's home early on March 17. The statement charged she was kept a prisoner in Stephenson's garage for nearly 24 hours and denied medical attention for bichloride of mercury poisoning. Harry Meschall, Louis Brunner and Pete Majors, colored, the three prisoners taken to the farm on the morning in question, all told the same story. They said Klenck was not with them. Prosecutor Remy today bolstered up his rebuttal by summoning 25 additional witnesses to testify.

Reopen Investigation Of Shenandoah Disaster

Washington, Nov. 11. — (United Press)—Aroused by the assertion of Colonel William Mitchell that he will prove to his court of generals that the navy sought to obtain false testimony from Mrs. Margaret Lansdowne, widow of the Shenandoah commander, the naval court of inquiry, which was closed nearly a month ago, is a direct result of the Mitchell attack, it is learned. Mrs. Lansdowne testified to the court once before and was dismissed. The allegation which the court now will delve into and which it ignored before, is that an attempt was made to have Mrs. Lansdowne repudiate her statement, made following the disaster that her husband was forced to take the Shenandoah on its fatal flight against his will.

DePaola And Cooper To Race At Charlotte, N. C.

Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 11.—Peter De Paola and Earl Cooper, champion auto drivers, are entered in the 250 mile Armistice day race in the Charlotte speedway here this afternoon. Fourteen other drivers are entered. The qualifying laps which averaged around 135 miles an hour, indicated a series of record-breaking performances.

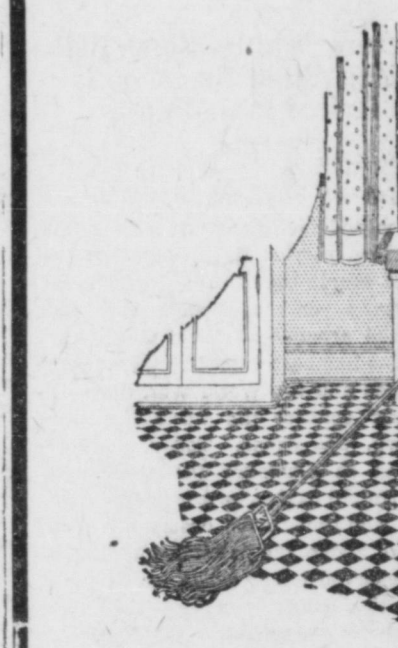
