YELLOW JACKETS TO PLAY BLUFFTON

Old Rivals To Meet In Last Football Game Of Season Here Friday

The Decatur high school Yellow Jackets will close their 1925 football season Friday afternoon in a game on Ahr's field with their old rivals, the Bluffton Tigers. The game is scheduled to start at 2:30 o'clock. Admission will be fifty cents.

The Yellow Jackets have a much better record for the season than the Tigers, although Decatur has won only one game to date. Bluffton has not won a game this season, or for the last few seasons, and their games have been lost by top-heavy scores in most cases, while the Yellow Jackets have won one game, tied one and lost two contests by narrow margins. However, the Tigers pepped up last Saturday and held Hartford City to two touchdowns and they can be counted upon to furnish plenty of fight in the game here Saturday.

LEADERS LOSE AT PORTLAND

Decatur Basketball Quintet Drops First Game Of Season, Score 22-19

The Decatur Leaders opened their 1925-26 basketball season at Portland last night by dropping a hard-fought and well-played game to the Portland Independents by a score of 22-19. A disastrous first half, in which the Leaders failed to get going, spelled defeat for the Decatur quintet. The half ended 13 to 5 in favor of Portland. The Leaders found themselves in the second half and outscored their opponents, 14 to 9, but could not overcome the lead. The Leaders scored eight field goals to seven for Portland.

The Leaders showed up good in their initial appearance this season. They had possession of the ball more than half of the time, but could not hit the basket in the first half, due mainly to lack of practice. Sheener Miller, captain of the Decatur high school team last season and all-district floor guard, played forward for the Leaders last night and scored four field goals and three free throws. He was high point man of the game. Webb Oliver, veteran center for the Leaders, hit the basket for three field goals in the second half, after being shut out in the opening period. Andrews substituted for Shirk during the last ten minutes and scored one field goal.

Portland has a fast outfit this season. The same team plays under the name of Muncie Merchants part of the time, it is said. The team is composed of former high school and college stars. The Leaders likely will open their home season next week at the Catholic high school gym, but their opponents have not been selected yet. Portland will play a return game here in the near future.

Rickard Wants To Sign Waker And Milligan

New York, Nov. 11.—Balked in his efforts to make a number of other matches, Tex Rickard wants to sign Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, in Madison Square Garden in the Christmas fund benefit. Milligan has already signed an agreement to appear in three fights for Rickard and Walker gave his terms some time ago when Rickard was dickering for a match between the welterweight champion and Dave Shade, the California challenger.

It is understood, however, that Shade has decided to forsake the welterweight class and fight as a middleweight in the future as he fears that he will injure himself by reducing to the weight.
It is said that Walker wants \$100,000 to defend his title in a decision bout but Rickard cannot pay him that much as there would be nothing left for the Christmas stocking. The New York boxing commission also passed a rule some time ago that at least fifty per cent of the receipts must be given to the charity for which benefits are given.

Ike Vosdich will probably fill the captain's shoes. Otherwise the team is in good shape for the homecoming game Saturday with Carnegie Tech.
Lafayette, Ind. — Coach Phelan is stressing defensive work in practices this week. Expectations here are that Purdue will resort principally to an aerial attack to realize the hope "if we can only beat Northwestern Saturday."

Iowa City — Passing and line backs are coming in for the principal work this week of the Iowa squad. "Cowboy" Kutsch and Schirmer are going well in the scrimmages.

Bluffton, Nov. 11. — The Triangle Sporting Club was auspiciously launched with a charter membership of 68, at the meeting held Monday evening at the American Legion rooms. The aims and purposes of the club were dwelt on at length, temporary officers elected to serve until the next meeting night, November 16, and captains named to head membership committees, who will conduct whirlwind campaigns for additional members, starting Wednesday morning.

The officers named to serve during the period of organization were Tuck Sawyer, president; Homer Marshall, secretary and Ed Brammer, treasurer.
