Produce Companies Pay 28 Cents Per Pound; Price Lower Than Year Ago

Local produce companies report that the first turkeys of the season are arriving on the local market. The buyers' price is 28 cents today, compared to 32 to 34 cents a year ago. Reports are to the effect that the coveted birds will be made plentiful this season han last.

Last winter turkeys were scarce in the entire state and the prices in some localities mounted to record marks. The general price this year, so far, is considerably lower than last year and it is probable that the price will not get as high as last year's mark.
