

SMALL DOLLAR COIN PLANNED

Government Experimenting With Combination Gold And Silver Dollar

Washington, Nov. 13.—Admitting failure to popularize the silver dollar and the \$2 bill, treasury officials virtually have decided to mint a new coin, a combination gold and silver dollar, because of the rapid deterioration of paper money.

Experiments are now being made for a coin of smaller size than the present \$1 "cartwheel," to be distinctive in appearance to prevent it being mistaken for any other coin. It will be slightly larger than a quarter, and heavier, because of the gold. A gold center with a rim of silver is being considered.

Banking and merchandising interests which handle large sums of money have indicated to the treasury that such a substitute for the dollar bill would be very desirable. Those who prefer bills will still be able to get them, but the treasury is determined to put some of the "dollar exchange" business on a metallic basis.

In considering the new coin, offi-

cial of the mint declare dollars composed entirely of gold would be too small and the yellow metal would not withstand the wear and heavy usage to which the dollar is subjected, whereas an alloy would.

The recourse to metal coins followed an experiment for the reduction of the dimensions of the present bills by two-thirds or three-quarters, but it was found that the saving in printing and handling cost and in the consumption of paper was merely nominal and not enough to offset the cost of changing machinery in the government bureau of printing.

The hard usage to which paper dollars are subjected more than doubles the cost of currency production by the United States. The dollar bill is the common laborer of American currency. Workmen of all kinds carry them in their pockets while they are at work, and the bills are soon soiled by oil, grease, dust and grime.

Prince Of Wales Is Among Stock Exhibitors

Among the thousands of entries received by Secretary-Manager B. H. Heide in the International Live Stock Exposition which will be held in Chicago, November 28th to December 5th was that of H. R. H. The Prince of Wales, who will exhibit his famous bull "King of the Fairies" from his western Canadian ranch. Entries have been especially heavy in the cattle classes with the Milking Shorthorn breed showing the largest increase. Interest in the carload division has been much greater than ever before, insuring the largest display of market animals in the history of the show.

Farm boys and girls will exhibit over twenty-five per cent more baby beeves in the junior feeding contest than former year and for the first time will hold a separate auction at which their entries will be sold at the close of the show. Exhibitors will be allowed to enter their light horses in the Horse Show up to November 16, and their live stock in the carload

classes up to November 21, inclusive. When the final totals are recorded it is expected that the greatest array of purebred and market live stock ever assembled will be ready for the inspection of the army of visitors when the gates are opened on November 28th.

Fifty-one leading authorities including two from Great Britain have been invited to serve as judges in the live stock classes alone. Thirty-five international and national agricultural organizations have already announced meetings to be held during the Exposition. Twenty-five states from Oregon to Virginia have accepted an invitation to send samples of newly discovered varieties of crops to be displayed in a feature booth at the International Grain and Hay Show, which this year for the first time, is a regular department of the International.
