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PENNSY WRECK BEING PROBED

Death List In Thursday's Collision Reaches Ten; Engineer Suspended

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 13.—(United Press)—Federal and state investigations into yesterday's wreck near Monmouth Junction, when the Pennsylvania's mercantile express from St. Louis crashed into the rear of the overnight express from Washington, got under way today.

The death list reached ten when the last body, that of an unidentified man, clad in pajamas, was taken from the twist of steel last night.

Five of the dead had been reported at mid-afternoon yesterday. Arthur Gross, of Schenectady, who had regained consciousness while rescuers worked in the wreckage, died late in the day and the other four bodies were found as the evening wore on.

Two of the dead are as yet unidentified in a New Brunswick morgue. Six persons are in hospitals with severe injuries.

A statement given out at the offices of the Pennsylvania railroad read:

"The Pennsylvania railroad's committee in charge of the inquiry reached the conclusion that the engineer of train No. 6, (the Mercantile Express) did not observe the signals, which were properly set and in working order."

The engineer, Timothy J. Carroll, who previously had been at the throttle for 25 years without a mishap, has been suspended.

Gangland War Claims
Another Life In Chicago

Chicago, Nov. 13.—(United Press)—One more death was recorded in Chicago's gangland war today when Samuel "Samoots" Amatuna, leader of one of the beer running factions, died from wounds received Tuesday night. Amatuna was ambushed by two men who shot him down in a barber shop.

Samoots' death spoiled preparations for his marriage to Rose Pecoraro, his sweetheart for more than a year. They were to have been married in the event that it became certain that "Samoots" would not live, but he sank into unconsciousness suddenly and did not recover.

Amatuna, as gangland says, died game. He never whimpered to the police the name of his assassins.

Police believe that Amatuna's death was followed by a series of killings for "Samoots'" first thought after being shot was to rush to his brother and give him the names of the shooters.
