## MONROE BEATS BRIGHTON, 12-2

### Adams County Quintet Breaks Into Win Column On Foreign Floor

The Monroe high school basketball team broke into the win column Saturday night, after dropping its first three contests, and defeated the Brighton high school five, on the latter's floor, by a score of 12 to 2. Brighton failed to score from the field, the two points being scored by the losers on free throws. The first half ended with Monroe leading, 4-1. Hahbert, floor-guard, and G. Smith, forward, led in the Monroe attack. The Monroe lineup consisted of: G. Smith and Kessler, forwards; A. Smith, center; Strahm and Hahbert, guards. No substitutions were made. Coach Montgomery was unable to accompany the team and Eberhard was in charge. Brighton will play a return game with Monroe in this city on January 22. Monroe will play Poling high school, from Jay county, in the old gymnasium here Friday night of this week.

peace in Europe generally." There was an illusion to his escape from the recent plot to assassinate him. The man with the piercing eyes picked a pencil off his desk and tapped a little statuette.

"My person is made of iron like that," he commented, closing the talk to devote himself to a calendar which listed twenty appointments with individuals besides a mass of government business.

The Italian cabinet Saturday approved a bill increasing the powers of the premier, making him responsible only to the king and prescribing harsh penalties for assassination attempts or for future deeds and utterances displeasing to him.

## Four Killed When Flyer Crashes Into Freight

Renville, Minn., Nov. 16.—(United Press)—The Columbian, crack flyer of

the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, crashed into a freight train here early Sunday morning.

A check showed four dead and a score of passengers injured, none fatally.

Two passengers and five trainmen were taken to a hospital at Montevideo.

The dead: WILLIAM FILLMORE, Vine Hill, near Excelsior, engineer on the Columbian.

ABE YOUNG, Montevideo, engineer on the freight locomotive.

D. HARMER, of Minneapolis, head brakeman on the freight.

CHARLES D. DAVIS, St. Paul, a mail clerk.

The wreck occurred on a straight stretch of road a half mile west of here, at 1:40 a. m. The Columbian, bound for the Pacific coast, had left here only a few minutes before the accident occurred. The 90-car freight train, drawn by two engines and the passenger train crashed head-on.

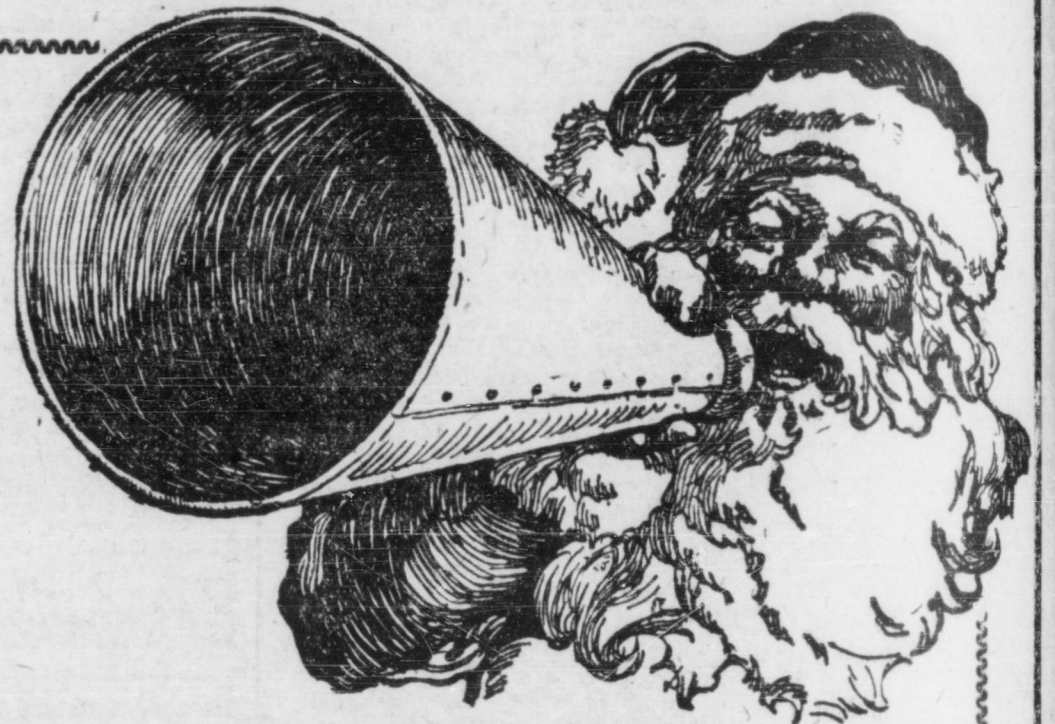
## Wells County Surveyor Indicted By Grand Jury
