The entire program will cost the county \$75,000 and the state \$125,000, it is estimated. The road will join at the county line with the proposed road from Huntington east through here and will form a portion of the Ben Franklin highway.


Hon. Hugh Daugherty, vice-president of the Flanagan Savings and Trust company, of Indianapolis, for the past dozen years, and prior to that the president of the Studebaker Bank at Bluffton, died yesterday, following a stroke of paralysis. He was eighty-two years of age and until recently was recognized as one of the leading bankers and citizens of the state. He was active in democratic politics in his day and was considered seriously as a candidate for governor and other high offices.
