

Comes Via New YorkParis, Nov. 19.—(United Press)—
The good folk of Eu, a quiet town on
the Channel coast of France, have
grown into the custom of having their
mail delivered to them via New York.The French equivalent for United
States is "Etats Unis," and in addressing
their letters, many French people
mark the envelope "E. U.". Careless
mail clerks toss all envelopes so
marked into the bags destined to be
carried to New York.So the French have addressed a
strong letter of protest to the French
Post Office realizing that letters in-
tended for them are but a cockshell in
the tide of mail addressed to the United
States, but urging that something be
done to emphasize the dots and
thus distinguish "E. U." from "Eu."
