was in Chicago when the riot occurred, refused to comment this morning but promised prompt and proper action.

The rioters disbanded about midnight and retired to their dormitories and fraternity houses.

habeas corpus by Judge Edwin S. Thomas in federal district court. The writ is returnable next Monday at Wethersfield when arguments will be presented in an effort to prove that the state of Connecticut cannot hang Chapman because he is a federal prisoner.

This contention is based on the fact that Chapman, with 25 years yet to serve for a New York mail robbery in 1921, was taken from Atlanta federal penitentiary last spring to stand trial in Hartford for the murder of Patrolman James Skelly in New Britain. His lawyers say he must be returned to Atlanta to complete his sentence before he can be executed.

Republicans Examine LaFollette's Speeches

Washington, Nov. 24.—(United Press)—Statements and speeches made by Senator Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., in his campaign for election are being collected by Chairman Watson of the senate committee on committees in an effort to ascertain if LaFollette criticized the republican party.

Watson announced today a meeting of the committee would be held in a week to decide whether LaFollette shall be admitted to the senate as a member of the republican party.

If LaFollette criticized the republican party or President Coolidge he will be ousted, Watson predicted.

Says Mrs. Rhinelander Represented Herself Of Spanish Descent

White Plains, N. Y., Nov. 24.—(United Press).—Additional testimony that Alice Jones, after she had become Mrs. Leonard Kip Rhinelander, represented herself of Spanish rather than negro descent, was given as the annulment suit brought by her husband, was resumed today.

Mrs. Joseph Rich, of Mount Vernon, corroborated the statements of her husband, made late yesterday,

that Mrs. Rhinelander had denied the colored blood now admitted by her counsel.

The supreme court, presided over by Justice McGrath, was marked by calmness today in direct contrast to the sensational scenes of yesterday when Rhinelander's two "mystery" letters to Alice were read after women spectators had been excluded and when the defendant, partially clad, was viewed by the jurors to establish her color.

No session of the court will be held on Friday, it was announced, and this was taken to mean that a verdict could not be expected until the latter part of next week.

Boston Club Must Pay Tax On Sale Of Babe Ruth

Washington, Nov. 24.—The United States board of tax appeals today ruled that the Boston American league baseball club must pay \$27,575.09 in taxes for the profit derived from the sale of Babe Ruth and Carl Mays to the New York Yankee club in 1919.

Greece Asks Indemnity Of \$687,280 From Bulgaria

Athens, Nov. 24.—(United Press).—Greece has notified the league of nations committee of investigation into the recent Greco-Bulgarian frontier clash that it desires indemnity of 142,000 pounds sterling, (\$687,280) from Bulgaria.

The clash between the two countries was ended when Greece, at the order of the league, retired from Bulgarian territory.

Bruene resigned yesterday effective December 1. Rhoades is auditor of the state securities commission and will be succeeded by Frank E. Wright, investigator for the securities commission.
