FOOTBALL GAME HERE THURSDAY

Portland Our Boys And Van Wert Cardinals To Play Turkey Day Game

Decatur football fans will receive a treat Thanksgiving afternoon when the Van Wert Cardinals and the Portland Our Boys, semi-professional football teams, will meet on Ahn's field in this city at 2:30 o'clock. Both aggregations are made up of ex-college stars and it is predicted that the game will be close.

The two teams met earlier in the season at Portland and the game ended 7-6 in favor of Portland. Both teams scored a touchdown, but the Cardinals were unable to make the point after touchdown. The game, which was arranged to be held in this city by representatives of the two teams yesterday, will close the season for both aggregations.

An effort was made some time ago to stage the game in this city but inclement weather prevented it. The game Thanksgiving will be staged rain or shine, the management stated. Arthur Hyland, of this city, will referee the game and "Shorty" Macklin, former Purdue star, will act as umpire.

The game will start promptly at 2:30 o'clock and an admission charge of 50 cents will be made. Portland reported today that more than 100 tickets had been sold in that city and about 200 have been disposed of in Van Wert. No advance tickets will be sold in this city, but may be had at the gate before the game. The gate will open at 1:45 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The Portland team has not lost a game all season and the Van Wert outfit also has an enviable record, having lost only two games. The public is cordially invited to attend the game.

Zupke Says Grange Is Deserving Of All Glory He Can Find

Champaign, Ill., Nov. 24.—(United Press)—"I'd welcome another Red Grange on my football team—but I doubt if there will ever be another \$100,000 player," Coach Bob Zupke declared today as the famous sorrel-topped gridiron flash became a myth to amateur athletics.

"Grange was a wonder and he is deserving of all the honor and glory he can find," Zupke said in an interview with the United Press.

"But let me add this—our Illinois team was not a one-man machine. Grange was just one of the players and if I could find another such sterling athlete and modest gentleman, I would welcome him on my squad."

Zupke was questioned about a statement he made last night at the annual University of Illinois football banquet when Grange and the other varsity players were awarded their letters.

"There will never be another \$100,000 player on my team," he said at the banquet and his statement was interpreted as a rebuke to Grange for turning professional. Red, himself left the banquet with that impression.

"Oh, no, I didn't mean that," Zupke said today. "What I meant was that it would be a long time before another player of Grange's ability came to college. If one shows up I'd like to have him at Illinois."

Red left the banquet before it was over, mumbling his regrets at leaving the university but declaring that he would not change his mind. His famous number, "77" will be preserved as a university trophy and tradition with other football emblems and will never be awarded to another Illinois athlete.

Sibley Elected Captain Of Indiana Football Team

Bloomington, Ind., Nov. 24.—(United Press)—The Indiana university gridiron machine next year will be headed by Frank Sibley, of Gary.

Sibley was elected captain at a banquet for the team last night. He played end this year.

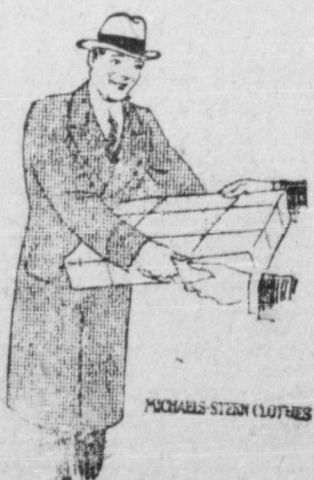
