committee will include: Creation of a bureau of civil aeronautics in the department of commerce to regulate and encourage commercial aviation.

Expenditure of \$10,000,000 annually by both services for new aviation equipment.

Establishment of separate budgets for each air service.

Destruction of all obsolete planes.

Four hours' training a month for reserve pilots.

This program has been drafted by the committee after months of hearings last spring and a prolonged study of the evidence during the summer.

Woman And Daughter Confess To Bank Robbery

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 30.—Mrs. Catherine Rogers and her 19 year old daughter, Zera, who have confessed robbing a bank at Renner last week, were held in jail today for failure to produce \$5,000 bail.

The two women, arrested Saturday, told authorities they had been driven to robbery for money to buy food and pay a mortgage on their home. Mrs. Rogers' husband is a disabled war veteran and is drawing government compensation.

PRATER ESCAPES DEATH SENTENCE

Boy Murderer Gets Off Easy For Disclosing Pool Room Conditions

Noblesville, Ind., Nov. 30.—(United Press)—Edward Prater, 16, escaped possible death in the electric chair today by disclosing conditions in Indianapolis pool rooms. The boy was sentenced to 2 to 21 years in the reform school when the prosecutor permitted him to plead guilty of manslaughter. Prater was charged with murdering a street car conductor.

Prosecutor Remy said that three murders had been committed in the last three months by youths who loafed in pool rooms.
