## WRITES POEM OF DAYS IN SCHOOL

### E. F. Gilpen, Formerly Of Adams Co., Recalls "Mc-Guffey" School Days

E. F. Gilpen, former resident of Pleasant Mills, who now resides in Indianapolis recently published a poem in The McGuffeyite, a paper published by the McGuffey organization, composed of persons who attended schools in Indiana when the famous McGuffey readers were used.

Mr. Gilpen is an enthusiastic member of the McGuffey organization and his poem was written of the days when he attended school at Pleasant Mills. It is as follows.

Time flies! Were the words, though in thought they were spoken. How strange the old spot of my boyhood appears, The past may remain in our memory unbroken, But the change—that will come with the fleeting of years.

For long years had passed since I last looked upon it, Looking backward, the time to me seemed but a day, As I gazed on the scenes of my boyhood a moment; Like the wind, I had come but a moment to stay.

For years I had cherished a fond inclination, 'Twas a dream of my youth I'd a longing to fill, As I stood on the threshold in past meditation, Of the river, the dam and the old water mill.

'Twas a picture not drawn by the artist in writing, As you stood by the dam, looking up to the east, Surrounded by trees, made its presence inviting, Slacked the thirst, without cost, of both traveler and beast.
