Actor Dies While Audience Awaits His Appearance

Chicago, Dec. 1.—(United Press) An unseen actor played the major role during the presentation of Massenet's "Herodiada" by the Chicago Civic Opera company here last night.

A huge audience in the auditorium theater moved restlessly as the curtain for the second act delayed in its rise for the appearance of Vitellius. After very marked delay the curtain rustled upward and the play went on. But the Vitellius who walked the boards was not the beloved William Beck, for that noted baritone lay dead in a hotel but a few moments from the theater.

Beck, 55, died from heart disease, physicians declared after an examination.

Beck was not due to appear until the second act, but when he failed to arrive in time to don his costume, a call boy was sent to his hotel. Beck was found in bed, having responded to the imperative touch of the greatest call boy, death.

Beck was born in Budapest and appeared in most of the great opera houses of Europe and the United States. He left no relatives so far as his friends here know.

Zimmerman will place it on the ballots of the next regular November election unless the drys win a court decision on the point that the legislature blundered in adopting a resolution instead of passing a regular bill.

French headed the list with Belgium, France, Great Britain, Italy, Poland, Czechoslovakia following.

The historic documents are to be deposited within the files of the League of nations at Geneva, with any ratifications by parliaments of the affected lands.
