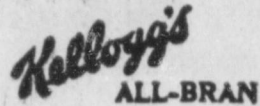

Next Meeting Of County Dads Is Set For Monday, December 21

The county commissioners adjourned this afternoon to meet in special session on December 21, at which time bids will be received for the furnishing of blank books, records and printing supplies for the next year.

The board will also meet on December 29 to allow bills and complete the record for the year.

The W. H. Engle bridge in St. Mary's township and the Samuel McAhren bridge in Washington township were accepted by the board. The bridges were improved this fall.

The assessment roll in the matter of the William C. Gillispie drain in Blue Creek township was filed and approved. It was shown that the total contract amounted to \$2,869.00 and March 20, 1926, was fixed as the final date on which the assessments could be paid before bonds were issued. Property owners affected by the improvement have the privilege of paying the assessments in full by the above date.

On January 5, 1926, the board will receive bids for the furnishing of an adding machine in the office of the County Recorder.

First Aerial Lunch Given On Air Liner

Geneva, Dec. 8.—(United Press)—The world's first "aerial luncheon" has been given several thousand feet over London in a huge English passenger plane which will shortly be put in service on the London Paris route by the Imperial Airways.

"Pick-up luncheons have often been taken by air passengers before but never an elaborate meal served by two stewards, and prepared in a kitchen aboard an air liner.

Guests reported that the glasses stood as steady as Guards and that they felt much less sensation of swaying and motion than aboard a train as the two white garbed stewards hovered up and down the alleyway between the chairs and plied the passengers with lobster salad, chicken patties, hampies, Russian salad, charlotte russe, cocktails, liquors and champagne.

The three feminists are Mrs. Mary Norton, of Jersey City, N. J., the first woman Democratic member in Congress; Mrs. Florence P. Kahn, widow of the late Rep. Julius Kahn, of San Francisco, Cal; and Mrs. Edith Nourse Rogers, of Lowell, Mass., widow of the late Rep. John Jacob Rogers.

All have considerable practical political experience, Mrs. Norton from personal participation in New Jersey affairs, and Mrs. Kahn and Mrs. Rogers from long contact with national affairs through their husbands.

T. W. Bess Claims Record For Butterfat Production

T. W. Bess, well-known farmer living south of Decatur, claims a record for butterfat production from five of his cows. Mr. Bess stated that, during November, he sold 206.5 pounds of butterfat from these five cows. Two of the cows have calves and a large amount of milk was taken for their feed. Mr. Bess has one Jersey, 3 Holsteins and one Shorthorn cow.

Columbus, Ind., Dec. 8. — (United Press)—Louis Cheshire, his wife and their nine-months-old daughter were under quarantine in the county infirmary today with scable, better known as "seven year itch."

Schloenaker Wins Point In Suit Against State

Indianapolis, Dec. 8. — (United Press)—Otto F. Schloenaker today held a temporary victory over the state of Indiana in his fight to regain \$50,000 alleged to have been given
