## Iowa's Biggest Corn Crop Is Worth Less Than Its Poorest Crop

Des Moines, Iowa, Dec. 9.—Iowa's 1925 corn crop, the greatest yield in the history of the state, at present prices is worth \$16,000,000 less than the poorest crop produced in the state during the last 25 years, and the value of the 1925 crop in Iowa is \$54,000,000 less than those of 1924. These figures were revealed today by Chas. D. Reed, director of the Iowa weather and crop bureau of the state department of agriculture in his annual crop summary and review presented before the annual meeting of the Iowa agricultural society at the state house.
