A. L. Trester, secretary of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, has ruled that the basketball game played between the Hartford township high school team and the Lancaster quintet at Linn Grove two weeks ago, was "no game." The game ended in such a way that the winner was in doubt and the day following the game, Referee Runyon ruled that the game was a tie, 27-27.

Clyde Romey, coach of the Hartford township team, has received a letter from Mr. Trester, in which he gives his ruling.

Mr. Trester also placed blame for the misunderstanding at the game on the officials, blaming Referee Runyon in the first place for not inspecting the equipment and seeing that a gun was used to signal the ending of the game and then blaming the scorekeepers for not giving a more pronounced signal when the game was over and for not being able to tell whether the last goal was made before or after their signal sounded.

Of course, Mr. Trester made his ruling directly on the rules and this, no doubt, gives Referee Runyon the worst of it. But everyone at the game agreed that Runyon did a good job of refereeing. The fact that he failed to inspect the equipment used by the timekeepers might be held against him, but the timekeepers, and even the scorekeepers didn't agree, so Runyon does not have to bear quite all of the blame.
