Lebanon — Seventy-five men working with pike poles raised and pinned together a barn on the Alvin Salle farm near here, in one hour and fifteen minutes.

Kokomo — Police are looking for Lawrence "Red" King, of Indianapolis. After the judge had fined and sentenced him, "Red" put on his hat and calmly walked out of the court room, passing six policemen. He is still at large.

Evansville — This city is to have a permanent life saving corps working under the direction of the Red Cross. The men will be trained in swimming and rescue work.

EVANSVILLE — The coeds of this school have been being neglected by the boys and in order to improve conditions are sponsoring a "Date a week Club". The purpose of the organization is to see that every student has at least one date each week with some member of the opposite sex.

Then followed the adoption of resolutions and again the radical element showed its strength by passing the resolutions which provided for support of the government export corporation. It means that the farm bureau federation is pledged to support a new bill in this session of congress which will substitute the old McNary-Haugen farm relief measure. The new bill will be along the same lines.

cause sectional riots where one community feels that they are being slighted in road improvements," he declared.

"By this time next year there will be a paved road from Angola to the Ohio state line, known as No. 25, which, with the exception of nine miles between Angola and Lagrange, will be hard-surfaced from state line to state line," he stated.

Mr. Rogers explained the system of highways eligible to federal aid. He also explained that under the federal road plan, the government is to pay half the cost for the construction of the hard surfaced roads designated by the commission as federal roads. "In a little while," he declared, "Angola and Fort Wayne will be referred to as cities on U. S. No. 27 road."


