

Indianapolis Over Run By Drug Store Sheiks

Indianapolis, Dec. 10. — (United Press)—Indianapolis is being over run by sheiks—not the desert type but the drug store variety.

This was the substance of numerous complaints made to Prosecutor William B. Remy by a delegation of club women yesterday.

It is said that in one section of the city women cannot go out on the streets without being accosted, and some housewives are keeping their doors locked at all hours in order to be safe from the terrorizers.

Remy is said to have told the women he was powerless to act because the matter was one for the police.

"If we can't get protection from the police or prosecutor's office, the taxpayers will organize and take matters into their own hands," Mrs. Emma Ruffel, spokesman for the group, said.

"If the conditions were made public as they really exist the city and entire state would be horrified."

The women's charges were:

That Washington street between Illinois and Pennsylvania streets is over run by sheiks.

That colored men insult white women on the south side.

That many women have been awakened to find men, both colored and white in their bedrooms.

Remy told the women that if they expected any cooperation they must be willing to make their names public.

"Don't be afraid of threats," he said, "I get them every day."

The public must be aroused to action in order to force the sheiks, terrorizers and other criminals to leave Indianapolis, the prosecutor told the delegation.

If the names of the terrorizers are made public and their victims assist in the prosecution public opinion will be stirred up and the criminals will leave.

Immigration Law Most Satisfactory, Is Report

Washington, Dec. 10. — (United Press)—The new immigration law has been most satisfactory and for the first time in history immigration restriction and control may be considered to be on a permanent basis, Commissioner General Hull declared in his annual report to Secretary of Labor Davis today.

"The most significant contributions to the situation are the inauguration of the practice of issuing immigration visas abroad, and the successful formation of the land border patrol," Hull stated.

No radical changes in the law were asked: "I feel certain that if any legislative changes are still required they will be simply amendatory in nature," said Hull.

Provision should be made in the law to provide for a countrywide registration of all aliens in the United States with provision for future registration of all newcomers within a stipulated time after entry.

Also, it was pointed out, to bring the classification of aliens in the country prior to the passage of the first quota law, such aliens should be required to appear for examination by the Public Health Service.

The five year statutory limitation should be removed, Hull recommended, in discussing deportation which he said should be continuous.

Steamship companies should not be

held liable for aliens who practice fraud in receiving passage it was urged, with the Secretary of Labor vested with authority to decide whether return of passage money should be directed.

Hull praised the work of the border patrol which he said was doing an effective job under limitations of money in checking the smuggling traffic. He asked for \$2,000,000, double the appropriation received last year, for enlarging the personnel off he patrol.

OUR MOOSE LARGER

Our American moose are similar to the elk of northern Europe and Elberia, but larger in size, says Nature Magazine. They range in our northern forests from the mouth of the Yukon south and eastward to northern Minnesota and Maine. The Shiras Moose is somewhat segregated, ranging along the Rocky Mountains into Wyoming, further south than any other species.

More Aliens Naturalized Than Arrived In Past Year

Washington, Dec. 10. — (United Press)—A total of 152,457 aliens were admitted to United States citizenship in the fiscal year ended June 30, last, the Naturalization Bureau of the Labor Department made known in its annual report issued today.

At the same time, 277,218 aliens filed declarations of intention to become naturalized. While the number of aliens naturalized was an increase of 1,947 over naturalizations in the preceding year, the declarations of intention fell off 147,322 to the smallest number since 1916. No explanation was advanced for the slump.

Of the total number of aliens naturalized, Poland led with 27,134, or 17.8 percent, with Italy a close second, with 26,137, or 17.14 percent. The British Empire followed with 23,815, or 15.62 percent, with Russia in fourth place, with 15,692, or 10.29 percent. These four nations contributed more than 60 percent of all naturalized aliens. Oddly enough, they are, with the

exception of Great Britain, the countries which have the smallest quota laws under the restrictive immigration regime.

Naturalizations ranged from these through 24 other countries down to Montenegro, a now defunct political entity, whose "men without a country" contributed 28 new American citizens, or .02 percent of the total.

Far more men became naturalized during the year than women, the re-

spective numbers being 133,881 and 18,576.

Among recommendations of the Bureau for legislation were that the fee for declaration of intention be raised to \$5 and for petition for naturalization to \$10, and that the provision of the law prohibiting the making of a declaration of intention within 30 days preceding an election be repealed.

"In some jurisdictions, because of frequent elections," the Bureau said,

"it is practically impossible for the alien to declare his intention at any time. In 1923, there were seven months in the year in which it was unlawful to do so."

The Bureau just failed of being self-supporting during the year, expending in the administration of the naturalization law, \$786,852.11, while taking in fees, \$743,836.54, a deficit of \$43,015.57. Last year the Bureau made a profit of \$17,996.87.

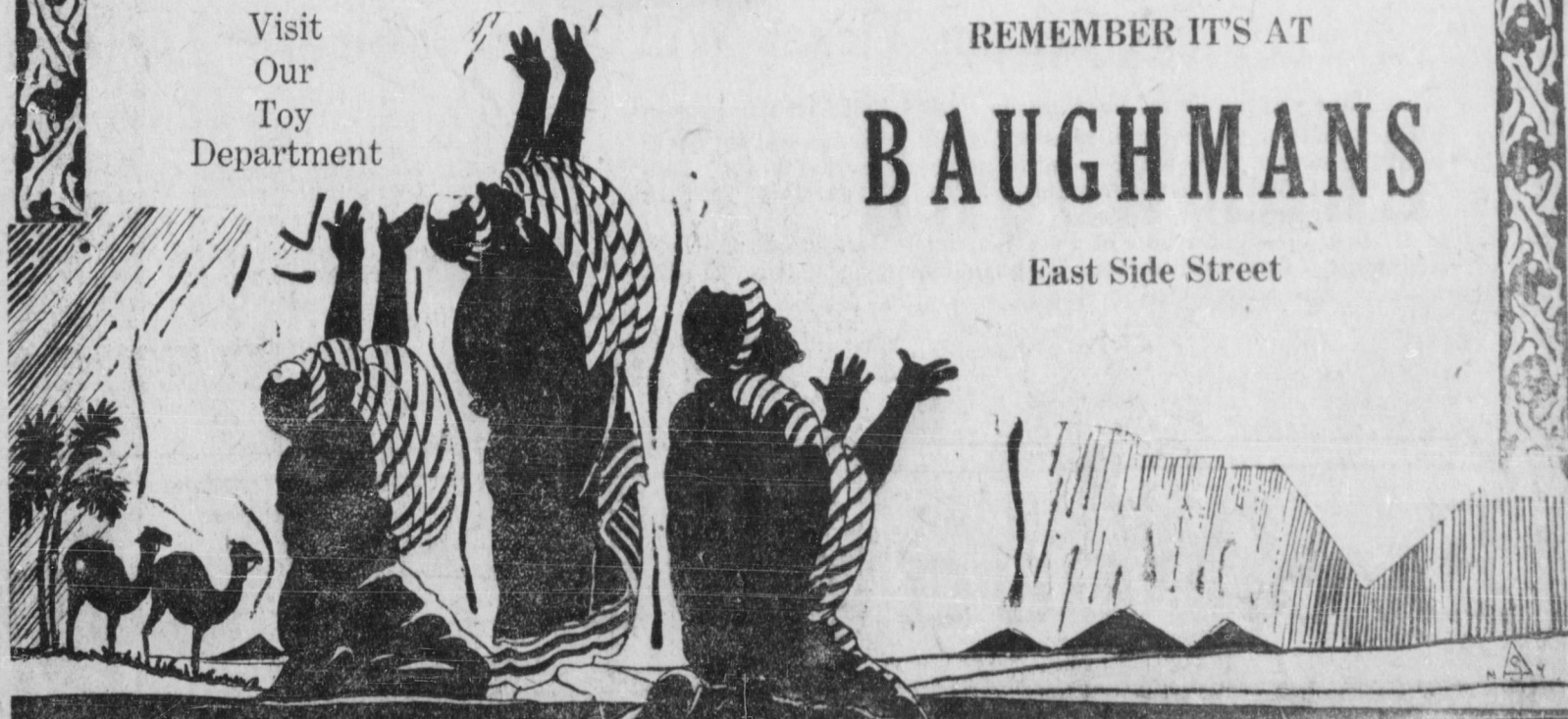
