Democrats To Fight Ousting Of Senator Nye

Washington, D. C., Dec. 15.—(United Press)—Democrats have decided to fight the ousting of Senator Gerald P. Nye, republican insurgent of North Dakota, and contest the report of the senate privileges and elections committee denying him a seat in the senate.

A minority report, favorable to Nye, is being drafted today by democratic members of the committee, Smith, North Carolina; Neely, West Virginia, and Stephens, Mississippi.

The report will contend that the constitution of North Dakota gives the governor power to fill all vacancies which are not specifically provided for by state law. In this case, the report will contend that the state constitution superseded the seventeenth amendment to the federal constitution, providing for senatorial elections.
