Guy Brown, who is in charge of the Seal and Health Bond distribution, said today that several other organizations had promised to buy bonds soon.

As Christmas draws near, the Adams county Tuberculosis society urges

that every person in the county use the seals and buy as many as possible. The sale of the seals is the only source of revenue for the local society and its great work is worth continuing. Hundreds of cases of tuberculosis in Indiana have been cured by the society and thousands of underfed children have received proper care during the school year by means of the Tuberculosis fund in the various counties.

The schools throughout the county are reporting favorably in the sale of the seals and not a single school has failed to meet its quota in the sale of the seals. The city schools are expected to do the same, at least. A total check on seals will not be made until the sale is over throughout the county, it was said today.

**Suit On Lien**  
Oliver S. Jones, of Fort Wayne, has filed a suit on a mechanic's lien in the Adams circuit court against Chalmers C. Schafer and others, demanding judgment for \$1,800 and costs. The plaintiff alleges that the above sum is due him for labor and materials furnished in painting, remodeling, frescoing and decorating a residence for the defendant. The mechanic's lien was placed on the house. Attorney Arthur W. Parry, of Fort Wayne, is counsel for the plaintiff.
