play half the population to police the other half and then fail; that a constitutional amendment, even if possible, requires too much time to furnish the necessary immediate relief and that it is high time to move for improvement through amendments and modification of the existing law.

"Almost the leading national activity," he said, "is to find ways to evade or beat the law."

Sale Of Hunting And Fishing Licenses Grows

Sales of hunting and fishing licenses in Indiana during October this year showed a marked increase over October a year ago, and it is expected that November sales will also exceed last November, George N. Mannfeld, fish and game division superintendent, reports to Richard Lieber, conservation director of the state.

These two months are the popular ones for the taking out of licenses, and conditions were improved this year over last by very seasonal hunting weather, together with the presence of large quantities of wild game. Last November's license sales numbered \$2,273, and this figure was outmatched the third week in November this year.

State game wardens in October arrested 174 persons for alleged fish and game law violations, and 164 paid fines and costs amounting to \$3,155.50. Nine cases are pending and one case was dismissed. Seventy-five of this number were apprehended hunting without licenses, while 42 took fur animals in closed season.

Mannfeld reports that approximately 2,302 acres of land in Starke and

Laporte counties, formerly the bed of the Kankakee river, and lying east and north of English Lake for a distance of 6 miles upstream, has come into possession of the department through an act of the 1923 legislature. This land will be posted and patrolled against hunters and used as a wild life breeding ground and sanctuary.

Latest French Cabinet Crisis Goes Unsolved

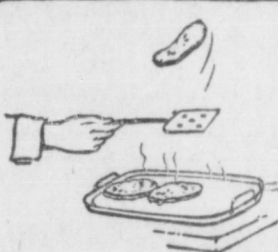

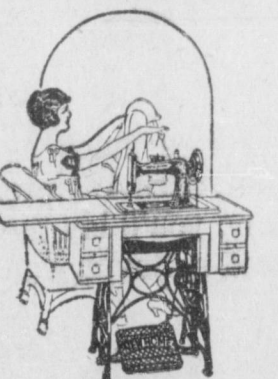
