## YELLOW JACKETS TO PLAY BERNE

### Battle Royal Expected When Two Adams County Teams Meet Here Friday

Two hard-fighting teams will clash in the Decatur high school gym Friday night, when the D. H. S. Yellow Jackets meet the Berne Fighting Five. The Berne team will be fighting to maintain its record of no defeats and the locals will be fighting to break into the win column. A large delegation of Berne fans are expected to accompany the Fighting Five to Decatur for the game.

Coach Kennedy's Yellow Jackets showed much improvement in their game with Fort Wayne Central here last week and if they maintain that pace in the game with Berne, they will have a good chance of winning. On the other hand, Coach Diltz, of Berne, has been sending his team through hard workouts in preparation for this game and the quintet is pointed for this battle.

The Yellow Jackets are in good condition for the game and are full of fight. One of the largest crowds of the season is expected to see the contest.

### "Red" Grange Out Of Game Until Christmas

Champaign, Ill., Dec. 16.—(United Press)—Harold "Red" Grange will be unable to play football until Christmas.

Grange made this announcement himself during a brief visit to the University of Illinois where a few weeks ago he was a student and a campus idol. He came here from Danville, Ill., where his injured arm was treated by Dr. E. B. Cooley, father of one of his managers.

Dr. Cooley found the ligaments in Red's arm torn and advised the sorrel-top gridiron flash to "take things easy" until Christmas, at least until Red's professional team is scheduled to open its Florida invasion on Christmas day, meeting an all-star team at Coral Gables. Dr. Cooley will accompany Grange on the trip and will watch him closely.

Grange had no comment to offer on the threat of the motion picture owners of America to bar him and any films in which he appears from their theatres. He planned to return to Chicago this afternoon.

### Northwestern's Plan To Build Triple Decked Stadium Is Knocked Out

Evanston, Ill., Dec. 16.—(United Press)—Northwestern university's plan to build a huge triple-decked football stadium, thus providing the greatest number of seats possible between the goal posts, was knocked out by the Evanston city council by a ruling that the stadium could not exceed the city's regulation height of 80 feet. It had been planned to raise the stadium to a height of 126 feet, but building will go ahead on the 80-foot plan.

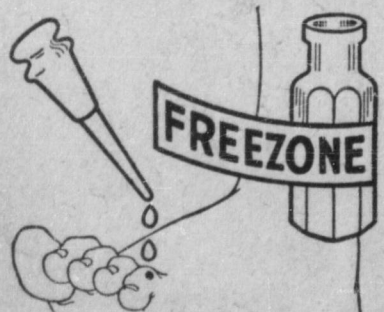
