bered these figures are much lower than for the production of average corn in this community, since the yields were high and it was observed according to the record books, that the cost of growing corn lowered the yield increased. Also, the books were submitted by those boys having the highest yields, several having lower yields failing to submit books.

It is emphasized that the winners named above may not be the winners in the final summary of the contest, since the record counts only 35 per cent of the total grade. Yield is given a weight of 30 points, cost of producing the corn 15 points and rank of 10-year sample in the county corn show, 20 points. In grading the record books.

completeness, accuracy and neatness were the main points considered.

County Agent Bueche is now engaged in checking all the record books in order to verify all records and determine grades on cost of production. This is said to entail considerable work, as errors are numerous and overcharges and undercharges are not at all uncommon. It is doubtful if a complete report can be made before next week.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.—The tax bill debate, after smoothly sailing through the normal and surtax provisions and repeal of the publicity clause, reached the controversial subject of the inheritance tax and the board of tax appeals today.

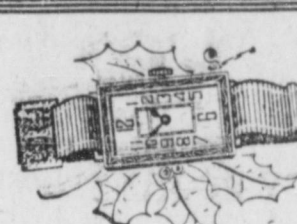

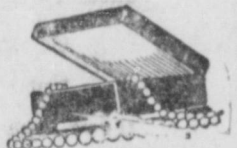

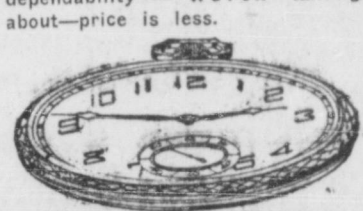
