Chicago, Dec. 17.—(United Press)—Grain futures sold lower in initial business on the Chicago board of trade today.

Dividend sentiment saved wheat from a drastic reaction. Local traders caught long overnight offered grain freely. Inactivity on the part of traders who have faith in the accuracy of Argentine's bearish crop report checked the sinking spell.

Corn was dull but showed stubborn resistance to wheat's depression. Trade was small.

Oats followed corn to a slightly lower opening.

The case of Geary & Barnett, M. D., vs. the William H. Myers estate has been set for trial on January 4.


Guardian Files Report
