

27 ADAMS COUNTY STUDENTS AT I. U.

State University Unable To Accomodate All Prospective Students

Bloomington, Ind., Dec. 17.—I. U. students from Adams County and other counties of the state will return home for the holidays Tuesday, Dec. 22, carrying with them a new appreciation of the seriousness of their training at the State University, if they heed the challenge of President W. L. Bryan.

In an all-University convocation address, the I. U. president told students that public faith in higher education rests largely with what students are able to show for it.

"If the people of the state see that you are getting at school what they established the school to do, they will pour out their treasures through the legislature and through direct gifts," said President Bryan. "They will believe in it if they believe in you, their children. If, along with your love of liberty, you elect discipline for yourself as intensely as you expect the football team to choose discipline for the sake of victory, the cause of education will be altogether safe."

"We have striven to establish a University in which society at its best should provide paths leading from every corner of the state to society at its best in many sorts of excellence. For this we need money. We need far more money. The people who spend numberless millions for chewing gum and cigarettes, movies and gasoline can afford to educate their children. The people of the state must believe in this."

"What I want more than money is students to whom the great vocations call with a passion and an austerity beyond that of any athletic game. There are many such here before me. It is you who must make the University of Indiana."

More students than ever before have registered at Indiana University this fall, and several hundred seeking work in various departments found them

overcrowded and had to be turned away. The total enrollment of different students for the various terms this year will exceed 5,500, as compared with 5,067 for last year. The increase is largely due to the addition of the dental school by legislative action.

HOOSIERS ARE SAVING MONEY

Bank Reports Show Increase In Bank Deposits Throughout State

Indianapolis, Dec. 17. — (United Press)—The people of Indiana today are laying the "solid foundation upon which future prosperity will be built," according to T. D. Barr, head of the state banking commission.

Barr made this statement after a careful analysis of the reports submitted by various Indiana banking institutions.

The analysis was made by comparing the deposits shown by ten of the leading banks of the state, in the called statements of September 30 and June 30.

In practically all instances these reports showed that savings deposits were increasing throughout the state.

Such a condition, Barr said, means that the people of the state are attempting to regain their financial balance.

Another feature shown by a comparison of the reports was that in prac-

tically all instances a big decrease has been shown in the amount of loans made by the banks.

Barr pointed out that such a condition can be taken to mean only one thing that the people of the state are saving their money and then paying off such loans as they have outstanding.

"I would not say that these figures mean prosperity is here," the bank commissioner said, "because prosperity is a condition that is above the average. The figures do mean, however, that the people of the state are building a solid foundation upon which prosperity will be built."

While a decrease in the amount shown as "demand deposits" or checking accounts was noted, Barr explained that such money as is held as demand deposits is usually the money used for liquidating loans.

He pointed out that where ever a decrease in the amount of demand deposits was shown there was a corresponding decrease in the amount of loans.

During the three months covered by the figures none of the gains in deposits were sensationally large, and the amount of retired loans also was not exceedingly great.

This condition, it was said, means that the people are working along conservative lines, seeking to better their

credit but not at the expense of their general business.

The banks used by Barr in compiling his figures were the Floyd County Bank, at New Albany; the State Bank at Washington; the Central State Bank at Connersville; the Marion State Bank at Marion; the Terre Haute Trust Company, of Terre Haute; the Boone County State Bank of Lebanon; the St. Joseph Loan and Trust Company, of South Bend; the Lincoln Trust Company, of Fort Wayne; the Peoples Trust Company, of Muncie and the Union Trust Company, of Greensburg.

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Four Decatur Students At Ohio State University

Columbus, O., Dec. 17.—Attendance for the summer and fall quarters of the current school year at Ohio State University, with duplicate names excluded, is 10,725, according to the recent report of Miss Edith D. Cockins, registrar. The figure is a new high mark for the University.

Registration for the present quarter, the second of the present academic year, is 9008, also a record. The summer quarter attendance was 2,826, likewise a new high mark.

As heretofore more than 90 per cent of the students are from Ohio, but all

save half a dozen of the other states are represented as well as a number of foreign countries.
