Chicago, Dec. 19.—(United Press)—Small fractional changes were recorded in first dealings on the Chicago board of trade today.

Wheat opened firm to slightly higher. The unsettled undertone and apparent lack of definite trend acted as dampers on bullish enthusiasm. Conflicting opinion on the Argentine crop figures, it was apparent, has reduced considerably the volume of speculative interest.

Moderate buying by industries offset bear tendencies in corn.

Oats were lifeless and without features.

Provisions advanced a few cents on buying by short cash interests.

Notorious Kentuckian Dies At Louisville

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 19.—(United Press)—Rector Johns, 60 years old, released from the federal penitentiary at Atlanta three weeks ago, died here yesterday, Johns, a wealthy real estate dealer, was indicted in Indianapolis in the summer of 1923 for an alleged violation of the federal interstate motor act. He had served ten months of an 18 months sentence, having been released on account of ill health. His death ended, perhaps, as turbulent a career as any Kentuckian ever had, as he had slain at least five men, according to official records and was three times tried for bank robbery before being sent to federal prison for conspiracy.

After a few months there, they motored to California, 3,000 miles across the continent and then made a five-hundred mile boat trip to San Francisco. Frank, Jr., enjoys it all, the train, the auto, the ship. Each year he sends his grandmother a box of California fruits. It came this year, but with orders not to open until Christmas. Frank's daddy is conducting a studio at Los Angeles, and is doing well. He was in business here

for several years. Mrs. Erwin was formerly Miss Catherine Lingen, of Huntington.

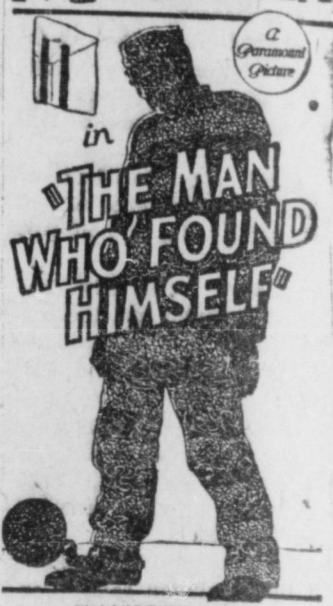
