OPENING GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, Dec. 22.—(United Press)—

There was little change in opening

grain prices on the Chicago board of

trade today due to pre-holiday dullness.

There was scattered buying and a fraction-

al advance in December old variety

and May new by commission houses.

Slight recessions were made in other

options.

The corn trade was evenly divided.

Commission houses accepted offers

from heavily supplied traders creating

a firm undertone.

Oats were inclined to easiness without

out features.
