Chicago, Dec. 22. — (United Press)—Louis F. Swift, commanding figure in the packing industry, is preparing to relinquish the presidency of the \$340,000,000 Swift Packing company, according to rumors in LaSalle street financial circles today.

Swift, according to the rumor, will resign from the presidency in order to accept the created post of chairman of the board of directors, at the annual meeting of stockholders January 4.

Coincident with Louis Swift's resignation, it is expected that Louis' brother, Edward F., senior vice-president of the company will also resign and become chairman of the executive and finance committee.

If this arrangement does go through, the rumor has it as a certainty that Gustavus F. Swift, Jr., will be promoted to the presidency.
