Miss Mildred Donaldson of Warsaw, is visiting at the Sprang home.

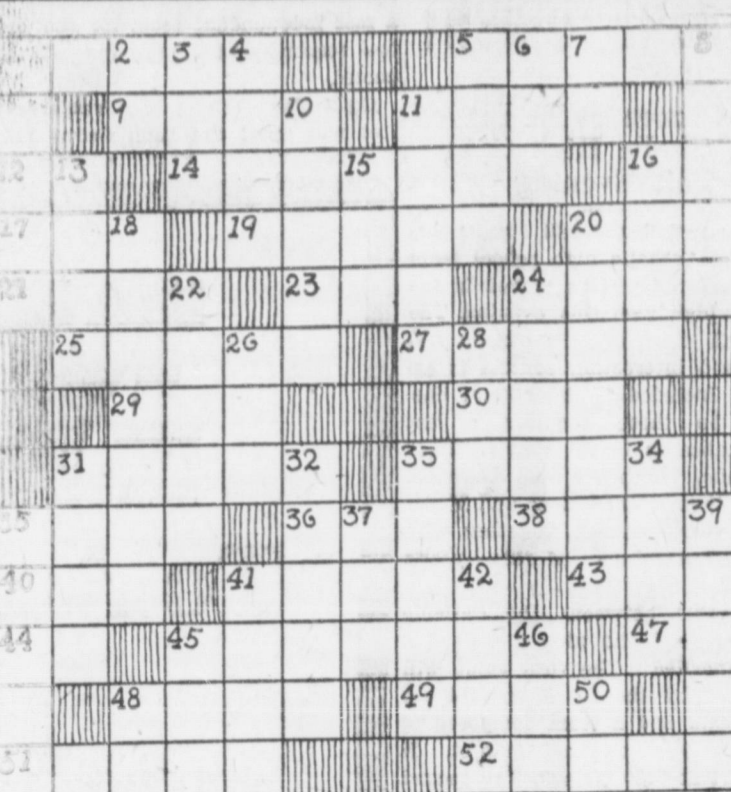
Miss Dorothy Sprunger, of Geneva, is spending several days here with friends.

POLICE ARREST 591 IN DETROIT

Five Simultaneous Raids On Gambling Resorts Net Many Men And Devices

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 30. — (United Press)—In five simultaneous raids on downtown gambling resorts here last night, police arrested a total of 591 men and confiscated cash amounting to approximately \$15,000. The raids involved sledge hammer attacks on bolted doors and search through secret rooms gained by concealed passages. Gaming instruments, dice and other equipment found in the establishments were ordered dismantled and destroyed.

The order was issued by David Jennings, security commissioner following an opinion handed down by Attorney General Arthur Gilliom.

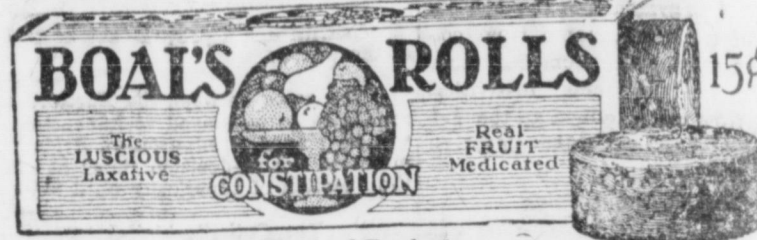
The order will affect about 100 brokers and approximately 800 banks in all parts of the state, it was said.
