## More Than \$50,000,000 Worth Of Security Sales Registered During 1925

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 4.—(United Press)—More than \$50,000,000 worth of security sales were registered with the Indiana Security Commission during 1925, the report of David Jamnisch, state security commissioner, made public today.

The commission also rejected applications for permission to sell securities the par value of which would have been \$1,588,900, the report showed.

In making public the report, Secretary of state Frederick Schreiner, to whom it was submitted, pointed out that the commission collected \$11,963.90 in fees and spent \$28,336.23 in conducting the department.

The outstanding piece of work done by the commission, it was said, was the rejection of the grain marketing company's proposal to sell one million dollars worth of preferred stock to the farmers of the state.

**W. B. Hiner May Seek Senatorial Nomination**

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 4.—(United Press)—Another prospective candidate for the republican senatorial nomination appeared on the political horizon today in the person of W. B. Hiner, president of the Red Ball Transit company.

Hiner admitted he was giving serious consideration to the question of making the race but said he would not make a definite decision for some time yet.

If Hiner enters the senatorial primary scrap he will oppose Senator Robinson for the short term nomination, he said.

Hiner is a native of Clinton county and was a pioneer in the organization of the bus industry in Indiana.
