OPENING GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, Jan. 7.—(United Press)—Grain futures had a mixed opening on the Chicago board of trade today. Wheat lost fractionally in a spurt of selling credited to those having large supplies. Corn advanced on buying by those who believe the market has higher tendencies. Oats followed corn.

Failure to absorb liberal offers from commission houses weakened the leading cereal. Foreign news was improved with Liverpool showing a slight upturn.

Buying in corn swept aside bear factions. Demand for the cash article showed improvements.

Oats advanced under influence of corn.

Provisions trailed with offers heavy and buying light.
