that of telling the people the beautiful things of the great outdoors, the joy of living it, the profit of studying it; and the further purpose of establishing 'Lumberlost Trail' over the highways from Lumberlost Cabin, south at Geneva, Indiana, to Lumberlost Cabin, north on the banks of Sylvan lake at Rome City, Indiana, a distance of approximately eighty miles and to mark and beautify it and seek to make of it a model highway; and also an effort to be made to collect and publish data regarding the great historical features of this section;

"Therefore be it Resolved: That the Decatur Industrial Association highly approves of this movement and believes that success in the undertaking will be of lasting benefit to our people and hereby instructs and empowers its officers and directors to render such assistance from time to time as they at the time may deem wise and helpful."

The resolution was unanimously accepted by the association.

L. M. Busche, county agricultural agent, gave a report on the boys' and girls' farm club work sponsored in Adams county by the Industrial Association and the report was highly favorable to the way in which the work was carried on. Mr. Busche read several letters from grateful boys and girls telling of the great benefit they derived from the club work.

Professor T. A. Coleman, of Purdue University, was the principal speaker of the evening and he delivered a very interesting address, explaining the relationship of the business man to the farmer. Mr. Coleman stressed several good points of relationship and urged the business man to assist the farmer in locating existing elements which are detrimental to present day farming. The address was greatly appreciated.

After Mr. Coleman's address, all members were given an opportunity to express their thoughts. Some plans were suggested for the coming year, and they will be discussed later after the association is organized for the ensuing year.

Three directors for the association were elected from six of the nine old ones to serve one year and three new directors were elected to serve for three years. Those elected for one year were Avon Burk, John Carmody and William Linn. The three new directors are, Carl Pumphrey, A. R. Ashbaucher and Dick Heller. The three directors who were not up for election last night are Cal E. Peterson, France Conter and George Krick. The three retiring directors, after two years' service, are Oscar Lankenau, Hugh Hite and Arthur Holthouse.

The directors will meet in the next few days and organize for the year.

Four firemen are in hospitals suffering from injuries sustained in fighting the blazes and plans are being made for the funeral of Camiel de Vrie.


