Wisconsin Governor Discusses Farm Ills

Madison, Wis., Feb. 5.—(United Press)—Agriculture in the middle west is staggering under the burden of a woeful lack in an efficiency and economic system of distribution, Governor Blaine declared here last night in addressing the annual banquet held in connection with the University of Wisconsin's department of agriculture "Farm Folks' Week," which closes today.

"The railroads lack adequate and efficient terminals," Governor Blaine said. "On the Great Lakes, where passing attention has been given by the government to the necessary and adequate docks and wharves for lake commerce, and so lake commerce has been neglected.

"If constructive thought had been given to these questions, more water routes, more outlets, improved harbors and more adequate terminals would have gone a long way, in solving our restricted means of distribution."
