MINERS MEET TO CONSIDER TERMS

Ratification Of New Wage Contract Expected To Be Made Today

Scranton, Pa., Feb. 16—(United Press)—Ratification of the new anthracite wage contract by the tri-district convention now in session, was expected late today, thus enabling 158,000 miners to resume work after being idle since Sept. 1. Several hundred delegates were in attendance when the convention began in Town Hall today. Leaders hoped to expedite business in order to reach a vote on the ratification of the pact sometime today. John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, conferred with miners' leaders before the sessions began, and it is understood arrangements were made to meet any opposition which might be offered to the wage pact.

Grover Bergdoll Is Arrested In Germany

Berlin, Feb. 16—(United Press)—Arrest in Baden of the American draft dodger, Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, on charges of immoral behavior was deemed today in some quarters an attempt to get Germany to deport him.

While the extradition treaty between America and Germany is not yet in effect, it is pointed out that Germany, if it desired, could take him to its borders and order him not to return.

It was suspected that the present arrest might be linked with a magazine or newspaper "enterprise" maneuver, or perhaps he engineered by American ex-service men, who have long desired to "get" the dodger.

This suspicion was given some support when Bergdoll himself charged that he was the victim of a "frame up." He denies all knowledge of the alleged misconduct charged to him.

House Presses War Department Measure

Washington, Feb. 16—(United Press)—The annual war department appropriation bill, carrying \$339,581,924, an increase of \$6,965,293 over current

The measure provides for an enlisted personnel of 118,750 men. Funds in the bill for military activities total, \$261,081,169, while non-military activities receive \$78,500,755.
