# MINERS MEET TO CONSIDER TERMS

## Ratification Of New Wage Contract Expected To Be Made Today

Scranton, Pa., Feb. 16.—(United Press)—Ratification of the new anthracite wage contract by the tri-district convention now in session, was expected late today, thus enabling 158,000 miners to resume work after being idle since Sept. 1.

Several hundred delegates were in attendance when the convention began in Town Hall today. Leaders hoped to expedite business in order to reach a vote on the ratification of the pact sometime today.

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, conferred with miners' leaders before the sessions began, and it is understood arrangements were made to meet any opposition which might be offered to the wage pact.
