Opening Grain Review

Chicago, March 1—Grain prices opened irregular on the Chicago board of trade today.

Wheat itself was irregular. The May delivery being firm while July and September were fractionally lower. The weakness was caused chiefly by the failure of Liverpool prices to go up this morning in line with Saturday's advance in Chicago. What strength there was in evidence was brought about by the belief that private estimates of the amount of wheat in store would show marked decreases from this time last year.

July corn was higher on some buying of short covering nature. Other corn deliveries were off because of considerably heavy receipts.

Oats were unchanged to slightly lower in sympathy with other grains. Trading was slow.

Provisions were slightly higher.

WHEAT PRICES
TAKE BIG DROPMay Wheat Closes 6 1/2 Cents
Lower Than Saturday's
Price At Chicago

Chicago, March 1—(United Press)

Wheat prices dropped sensational-ly on the board of trade here today as dealers dumped their holdings on the market.

The downward trend in wheat started soon after the opening of the market but it was not until a few minutes before close that prices took their sharp drop. The finish in May wheat was \$1.59 a bushel a drop of 6 1/2 cents from Saturday's price.
