LAUNCH ATTACK ON TARIFF PLAN

Democrats Start Attack On Administration's Tariff Program

Washington, March 6.—(United Press)—An attack on the administration's tariff program, as part of the democratic plan to make the tariff dominant issue in the coming campaign was launched today by Senator Robinson, democratic floor leader.

He introduced a bill to reduce the personnel of the tariff commission to two members to obstruct President Coolidge's policy of appointment of men who favor his policies.

Robinson also proposed a resolution to authorize the senate finance commission to make a complete investigation of the commission's activities in bolstering up high tariff rates.

OPENING GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, Mar. 6.—(United Press).—Grain prices opened irregular on the Chicago board of trade today. Wheat was erratic, being unchanged in May new delivery but slumping in the May old and July deliveries while the September delivery was up 1-8c. The undertone in the pit was unsteady following returns from abroad that there would be little demand for American wheat for some time.

Corn opened higher despite the weakness in the pit. The slightly bullish tendency of corn is accounted for by local experts other than the wheat slump is due to a technical situation in the wheat pit alone.

Oats opened unchanged to up 1-8 in the July delivery.

Provisions opened lower.

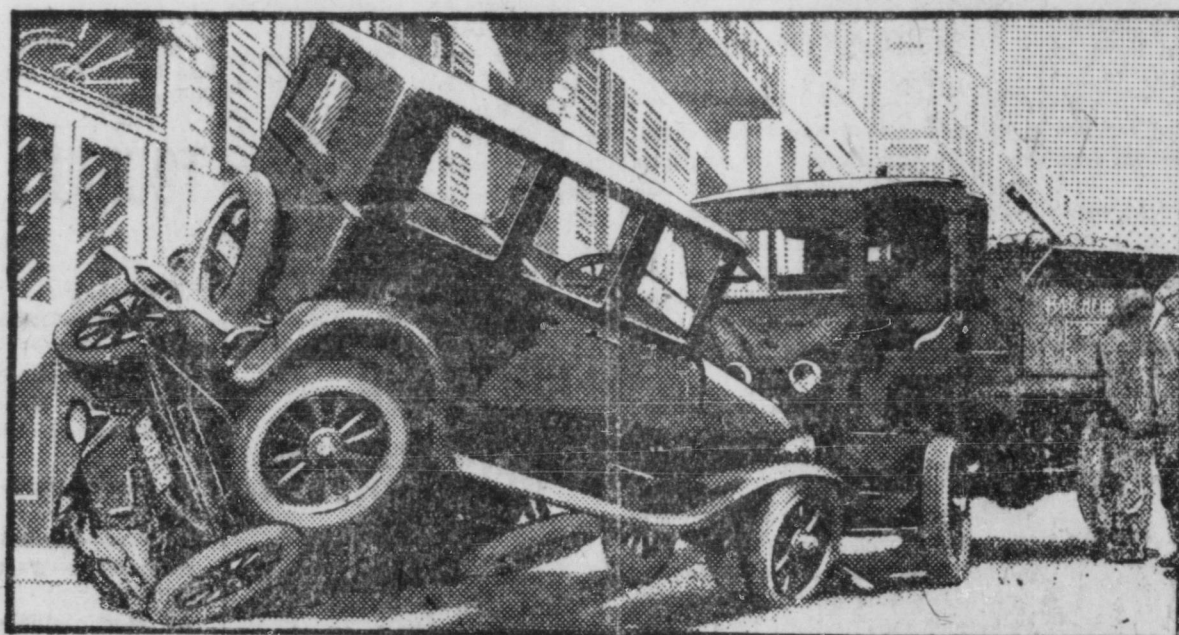
