## MARKET REPORTS

### Daily Report Of Local And Foreign Markets

#### OPENING GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, Mar. 8.—(United Press)—Grain prices opened irregular on the Chicago board of trade today.

The wheat pit opened with indications of being erratic. Both deliveries of May as well as September, were up from 1-8 to 3-4 over Saturday's closing level, while July opened 1-2 lower. Local traders were inclined to sit by and await the government report on the farm reserve to be issued tomorrow before making any decided move. Foreign markets opened uneven, Liverpool being slightly lower than Saturday's close while Buenos Aires advanced half.

Corn opened 1 1/4 lower in both the May and September deliveries, while the July remained unchanged. Week end receipts in this grain are expected to be quite large, accounting to some extent for the slightly bearish pit in today's opening.

Oats continued to be in a rut and like corn opened 1-4 lower in both the May and September deliveries and unchanged in the July. Lack of outside trading is given as the reason for the slightly lower as well as inactive market.

Provisions opened lower.

## CHANGE IS MADE IN RURAL MAIL ROUTE SYSTEM

### (CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)

Howard W. Mauller, present carrier on Decatur route nine, Howard Davie, carrier out of Pleasant Mills, and Harry E. Bauer, carrier of the Magley route will be dropped from the service under the new system. The names of the carriers at Berne, Geneva and Monroe were not available today.

The increases given the remaining carriers will range from \$200 to \$350 per year. R. O. Christen, carrier on route nine out of the Decatur office after March 31, will have the largest route, 42 miles, and his salary will be \$2,340.

The saving to the postal department comes in the payment of the additional mileage at \$30 per mile per year, whereas the basis of payment for a 24 mile route heretofore has been \$75. It is estimated that the saving in this county alone will be about \$6,480.00 per year.

The mileage for the change in routes was laid out by J. G. Hagy, postoffice inspector, who traveled over every mile of the rural routes last fall and reported the means of change to Postmaster General Harry S. New.

Under the new plan, Monroe will have two rural routes, Berne 3 and Geneva 3 after March 31.
