# A Ready Market, Plus A Guaranteed Price, Makes The Sugar Beet Crop One of The Best on The Farm For 1926

## HUGH SUPPLY OF CORN ON HAND

Over Hundred Million Bushels of Corn is Held on Indiana Farms, Report Shows.

### GREATEST IN TEN YEARS

Indianapolis, April 5—(I. N. S.)—There were 106,699,000 bushels of corn on Indiana farms on March 1, the largest amount in 10 years, exceeding the previous high record year, 1921, by seven percent and representing more than three times as much as last year's holdings, according to a report of the United States department of agriculture made public here today.

On the same date, wheat on Indiana farms, totaling 3,855,000 bushels exceeded last year's holdings by 732,000 bushels, despite a smaller crop and higher prices.

Supplies of oats were 18,897,000 bushels below last year's figures and below average.

Barley stocks totaled 75,000 bushels, 15,000 bushels more than last year.

Rye totalled 279,000 bushels, an increase of 18,000 bushels in stocks over last year, but a decrease of 207,000 bushels in shipments.

Prospects are that the low prices now prevailing for sugar will not endure beyond the harvesting period in Cuba, which ends in May. As there is a steady and satisfactory increase in the consumption of sugar everywhere it will take very little to bring about a more balanced situation and improvement in values.

Very little acreage has been planted in oats this year, because of the lateness of the season. The wet weather means that practically no beets will be planted until the middle of April. Plant part of your oat ground to beets.
