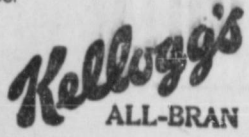

BELIEVES STORY OF DENVER MAN

Hartford City Woman Thinks Confession Of Celina Murder Is True

Portland, April 9.—Mrs. Hugo Lord, daughter of the man who was saved from the fury of a mob at Celina, O., in 1872, when his brother, Absalom Kimmel, and Alexander McLeod were charged for the murder of Miss Mary Belle Secauer, believes the confession of Thomas B. Douglas in a Denver hospital in January, in which he admits the murder of the girl.

Mrs. Lord, who lives at Hartford City, wrote to Harvey E. Drake, retired businessman of this city, who was present at the hanging, that her father had often told her that the person who committed the crime would confess sometime. Her father died October 12, 1925. She believes Kimmel and McLeod were innocent of the murder.

The Secauer girl was slain in the summer of 1872 when she was returning from church. She was hit over the head and then attacked. Her headless body was found in a clump of trees in Mercer county, Ohio, northeast of here.

Mr. Douglas' confession was recently received from Denver. He declared that he alone was responsible for the girl's death and that Kimmel and McLeod were innocent. He died a few days later.

Front-Drive Car Enters Annual 500-Mile Race

Indianapolis, Ind., April 9.—Another front-drive car—the Hamlin Front Drive Special—has thrown its hat into the ring, so to speak, by entering the Fourteenth Annual 500-mile International Sweepstakes at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, May 31. Last

year, it will be recalled, Dave Lewis in a front-drive Miller Special, took second place, less than a minute behind the winner, Peter DePaola. In a Duesenberg Special.

Behind the entry of the Hamlin Front-Drive lies the story of a group of Chicago men who are putting their product to the supreme test of high speed, every other test having been satisfactorily passed. For six years the Hamlin Motor Company, of Chicago, has been designing, building and testing a front-drive automobile. The cars have been driven from coast to coast, up and down mountains, through sand and mud and snow. On May 31 will come the final demonstration of the durability of the car's front-drive construction.

In order to get the benefit of close association with the big two and a half mile brick track and the advice of seasoned racing men, the Hamlin car is being built at the shop of Chevrolet Brothers, Indianapolis.

The engine used in the racing car will be a four-cylinder Fronty-Ford, of a total piston displacement of 91.2 cubic inches. If the builders make the slightest mistake in their computations the car will be too big to enter the race, as the piston displacement limit this year is 91.5 cubic inches. The builders expect the engine to have a speed of from 5,000 to 5,500 revolutions a minute. At this speed the car will travel 110 miles an hour. It will be the first Fronty-Ford engine to be supercharged equipped. The supercharger will be of the blower type, with a speed of 1 1/2 times the engine speed, instead of four or five times, as was the case with cars in the last race.

The differential and transmission gears of the front-drive are placed at right angles to the frame of the car, directly in front of the engine. The weight of the front section of the car is carried on a separate axle from the driving one. There is a universal joint at each front wheel and one on each side of the driving mechanism. The Hamlin Company claim great things for their type of front-drive

construction, especially the simplicity and sturdiness of the universal joints. The wheelbase of the car is 102 inches. The Chevrolet Brothers have contracted to have the car at the speedway ready to run by May 1.

Convention Of Isaak Walton League Opens

Chicago, April 9.—(United Press).—A fight to dislodge William H. Dilg, president of the Isaak Walton League and founder of the organization, from the presidency may develop at the fourth annual convention opening here according to delegates arriving today.

These delegates charge that Dilg has mismanaged the league despite the fact it has grown to a membership of over 200,000 in the four years of its existence.

However, the delegates said, the charges will be kept from the floor if Dilg will accept a past as president emeritus of the order.

Dilg founded the league four years ago with a membership of 100 in Chicago. Now the league boasts something like 200,000 members and 3,000 chapters.

Its aim is to preserve outdoor life and to keep the nation's inland streams free from pollution.

Adams Says Fairbanks Is Seeking Nomination

Columbia City, Ind., April 9.—(United Press).—Claris Adams, candidate for the republican long term senatorial nomination, in the face of denials by Warren C. Fairbanks, last night reiterated his charge that Fairbanks is a candidate for the short term republican senatorial nomination.

Adams devoted almost his entire speech to a scathing attack on Fairbanks, and his Indianapolis newspaper.

He charged that Watson and Fairbanks sought to throw the short term nomination in convention so that Fairbanks could win the nomination.

"An Egg A Day" For Every Hoosier Urged By Nutrition Specialist

Lafayette, Ind., April 9.—"An egg a day," eaten by Indiana's three million population would increase the state's consumption of home produced eggs to 91,000,000 dozen or a total of about 140,000,000 dozen eggs which are produced on Hoosier poultry farms annually, according to Miss Flora Miller, nutrition specialist of the Home Economics Extension Department of Purdue University, which is emphasizing the nutritive value of eggs in the daily diet in connection with the observance of "National Egg Day," May 1, a movement sponsored by the National Poultry Council, with the various state poultry organizations cooperating. Three Purdue representatives are members of the Indiana State committee, including Miss Lolla R. Gaddis, head of the home economics extension department; Prof. A. G. Phillips, head of the Poultry department and P. G. Riley, also of the poultry department.

Eggs contain not only valuable proteins, but the vitamins "A," "B," and "D" and a large percentage of mineral salts such as phosphorus, calcium, iron, magnesium and sulphur, making them an almost perfect food for the adult when eaten in combinations with bread, meat, milk, rice, or any food rich in starch and fats. Eggs contain practically all the elements necessary

for the growth and the development of the young child, and should be given frequently at their meals. Children under three should be given eggs three or four times a week and "an egg a day" is a safe slogan, served slightly or softly cooked.

Soft cooked or raw eggs are more quickly digested than hard cooked or hard boiled ones, although the whites of "hard boiled eggs" can be easily digested if thoroughly masticated or finely chopped. Eggs are a wholesome as well as nutritious food, and are as free from outside contamination as it is possible for a food to be coming in nature's selfsealed package. Purdue's advice to adults is "eat more fresh eggs" and be sure young children get "an egg a day" or at least four a week.
