The Decatur high school baseball team defeated the Monmouth high school nine in a five-inning game played on the South Ward school diamond Wednesday evening, after school, by a score of 16-8. The game was arranged yesterday morning.

The Yellow Jackets hopped on to the offerings of Hill, who started on the mound for Monmouth, and batted him from the box in the first inning. Eight runners crossed the home plate in Decatur's half of the opening inning. Johnson relieved Hill and held the Decatur slingers at bay until the third inning, when three more runs were scored. Five-Day "Prohibition  
Rally" Opened In Michigan

Detroit, April 22.—(United Press)—

As an avowed protest against modification of the prohibition laws, the Anti-Saloon League of Michigan tonight launches a five-day "prohibition rally" characterized by state officers as "the most important meeting of its kind ever held in America." A resolution favoring the strict enforcement of the law and memorizing congress to that effect is regarded a virtual strain outcome of the deliberations.

More than fifty national, state and local leaders in the "dry" cause are scheduled to address delegates during the convention. Speakers include

all national officials of the Anti-Saloon League and the Women's C. T. U., congressmen, clergy, college presidents and business men.

Marion County Candidates  
Oppose Picking Of Slates

Indianapolis, Ind., April 22.—(United Press)—Candidates for nomination for county offices in the primary, May 4, today stood opposed to the selection of slates by the Marion county organiza-

tions.

Resolutions adopted at a meeting of the candidates demanded that organization leaders refrain from making any "hand picked" slates and leave the field open to all candidates.
